riders come to race. People come from far away to watch.



After the race, people touch the winning horse. They believe it brings good luck. The horses are the stars of the show. Families take pictures and cheer for the winners. In Mongolia, horses and people share a special friendship.

The Naadam Festival is not just about racing. There are also games, food, and music. Families come together to have fun. They eat foods like dumplings and fried bread. Children play games and laugh together. The whole community enjoys the celebration.
