

Key Features of the New Pearson Curriculum

Quick Checks

Quick Checks are assessment activities in the curriculum that provide teachers the opportunity to quickly view student progress on a lesson-by-lesson activity basis and determine which students need additional support prior to unit tests. Students must complete the Quick Check in each lesson to mark the activity as complete.

Benefits of Quick Checks

Quick Checks provide the following benefits to teachers and students:

- lesson-by-lesson Gradebook data to inform teachers about their students and how they are progressing throughout the course
- confirms a student's understanding of the lesson content
- prepares students for the assessment at the end of a unit and can also be used for review


Where to Find Quick Checks

Quick Checks appear at the end of each lesson activity.

A student can take their Quick Check by selecting the Next



Activity button to move through the lesson, or students can access the assessments through the Course Tree under Course Activities.



New Updates to Quick Checks

- Quick Checks occur after each lesson and take the place of quizzes. There are no quizzes in the new Pearson Curriculum courses.
- Quick Checks will default to count for 20% of a student's grade. Since they appear after every lesson, each individual Quick Check accounts for less than 1% of a student's overall final grade. These weights can be modified for users with Administrator or Teacher Author permissions.
- Quick Checks count toward the course grade for all students. This is a new feature for students in grades 3–5. Students in grades 3–5 will be provided with multiple attempts at Quick Check questions.

Sample Communication for Families

Below, you will find a sample communication to share with families if you are asked questions about Quick Checks.

You may adjust this message accordingly based on concerns and/or questions; however, these are the general points you should communicate.



Hello!

As your student progresses through their lessons, they will be regularly assessed on the content so myself or their other teacher(s) can see how they are mastering the course material. Your student will frequently complete Quick Checks in the new Pearson Curriculum courses, and they will count towards your student's grade in the course.

After your student completes a Quick Check, myself or their other teacher(s) will determine if they need more support in that area. Quick Checks will also help prepare your student for the unit test.

Note for grades 3–5: Teachers of students in grades 3–5 may also want to include that Quick Checks will now count towards the student's grade. These students will be provided with multiple attempts at Quick Check questions.

The following sections provide an overview of the SEL lessons in the new Pearson Curriculum as well as links to resources to help you prepare for these lessons and share them with your students.


SEL in the New Pearson Curriculum Courses

- Increased Academic Success Stronger emotional and social skills can improve academics.
- Healthier Relationships Student behavior will likely improve as students get better at problem-solving, working with others, and managing their emotions.
- Positive Social Behaviors Students interact better with others after being exposed to SEL activities.
- Less Emotional Distress Increase skills and knowledge gained through social emotional learning leads to fewer occurrences of depression, stress, anxiety, and social withdrawal.
